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
MY LASALLE LOVE AFFAIR

The first car I can remember our family having was a two-tone green 1940 LaSalle 52 "Special." I can remember taking trips in it for vacation, as well as riding along on local errands and some local excursions on Sunday afternoons. I loved that car. It was such a special car. None of my friends or relatives had anything quite so special. Well, my dad sold it when I was about 9 years old. I begged him to put it up on blocks in the back yard so that I could drive it when I turned 16 and got my driver's license. Unfortunately, he wasn't able to do that. A little sidelight — Dad replaced it with a 1947 Chevy coupe. My mom would mutter when she drove it that it was like driving a Singer Sewing machine, after driving the LaSalle!

Fast forward about 60 years, and I had been watching such shows as "Chasing Classic Cars" and "Fantom Works," thinking that it would be fun to have an old car, but I wasn't sure what I should get. Would it be the first car I drove, a 1954 Olds 88 two -door, or the family car, a little later, a 1959 Buick Invicta with those amazing tail fins. Possibly my first car, a 1962 Corvair, or my first new car, a 1967 Olds Cutlass Supreme? I had been thinking about this off and on for a while, but none of them seemed quite right. While I was watching a TV show, I can't even tell you what show it was, they mentioned LaSalle, Illinois. The light bulb over my head went off, blinking rapidly. LaSalle! That's what I should get! But, my first thought was they are probably too expensive.

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MY LASALLE LOVE AFFAIR

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I started looking on line and found a few LaSalles for sale at what I considered pretty reasonable prices. I wasn't looking for a show car. I was looking for something that I could drive around for the fun of it. But, it seemed like many were a kind of kaki yellow color, or were model 50s with the rear suicide doors. None seemed close to what we had, and they were pretty far away from Maryland. They just weren't what I was looking for. I had almost given up when I happened to run across an almost exact match for what my family had, a 1940 two-tone green 52 "Special." It was exactly what I was looking for!

I contacted the person in Connecticut who had it for sale, to see if it was still available, and it was. If I bought it, I was going to rent a trailer and bring it back. However, at my wife's urging, and especially after seeing some more photos showing the quality of the paint on the car, I decided that, if I bought it, I would have it transported back in an enclosed trailer. A good friend drove up with me to see it. It was even nicer than it looked to be in the photos. Cosmetically, it was beautiful. I drove it and it seemed to have some minor mechanical problems, the transmission was grinding some between gears and there was a loud clunk in the front end when you hit a bump, but the engine ran well, and it drove nicely. But, there seemed to be no really major problems with it. So, I bought it and had it shipped home.

The seller had bought it from the widow of the restorer. The restorer had died just before the restoration was completed, and his nephew completed the restoration. The person I bought it from had not registered it or used it at all. He just stored it and put it up for sale.

Turns out that there were more mechanical and other

problems than I expected. I had the transmission rebuilt, and that solved the gear grinding problem. There were stupid things, like there was no control for the windshield wipers. It turned out there was just a hole in the dash where it should have been, But that was okay, since there was no wiper motor either. The headlight dimmer switch was wired wrong, so that I only had high beams or nothing. None of the door locks worked, either inside or with a key. I had a list of over 30 things, large and small, that needed to be fixed. These have been challenging and fun to track down and get working.

The most time-consuming problem was with the cooling system. It didn't overheat, like our family's LaSalle did at times. But, at highway speeds it pushed coolant out of the radiator overflow at the rate of about a gallon on a 50 mile trip. Mysteriously, the temperature gauge didn't show that it was overheating. I tried everything I could think of, and everything related to the problem on the Cadillac LaSalle Club forum, to fix it. After again searching the forum, trying many different key words, I finally found two people who had addressed the exact same problem by having their radiators re-cored. I had mine re-cored, but It didn't solve the problem. After many months, a few years even, I finally found the problem. The ports that let the coolant from the block into the head between cylinders 5 and 7 were completely rusted shut, so that at higher speeds, the coolant between those two cylinders boiled, increasing the coolant system's pressure and pushing coolant out of the radiator overflow. We cleaned that out, installed new head gaskets, and that finally solved that problem. Of course, there still were others, but we have worked most of them out.

The LaSalle and I have had a long love affair. We were separated for many years, but we are back together now and probably will be for the rest of my driving life.
