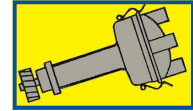

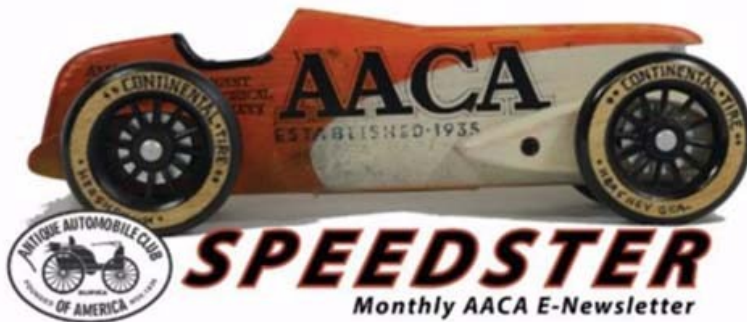

FIRST CARS: GEORGE HATCHER AND HIS 1971 MUSTANG **mach 1**

Ken:

Your email sparked another idea for you and your newsletter. What if you asked members about their first cars? This is a sketch of the car that changed my life and eventually made me a Ford dealer here in Easton.

Our daughter, Lynn, calls cars my “fatal flaw”.

It started when I was really little. My dad loved cars, and we would always go to dealerships to see the latest.

As my 16th birthday drew nearer, I could not wait to actually look for my first car. When the **September 1970 Motor Trend** arrived in our mailbox, I knew exactly what I wanted! The only problem was that that car wasn't exactly what my parents had in mind, so I asked what I had to do to get it. They gave me a laundry list designed to be unachievable—BUT I did it all!

So, my dad and I went to every Ford dealership everywhere—including the big ones in DC—to see all of the many combinations possible. I poured over the Mustang catalog and finally decided on this color, **Bright Blue Metallic**:



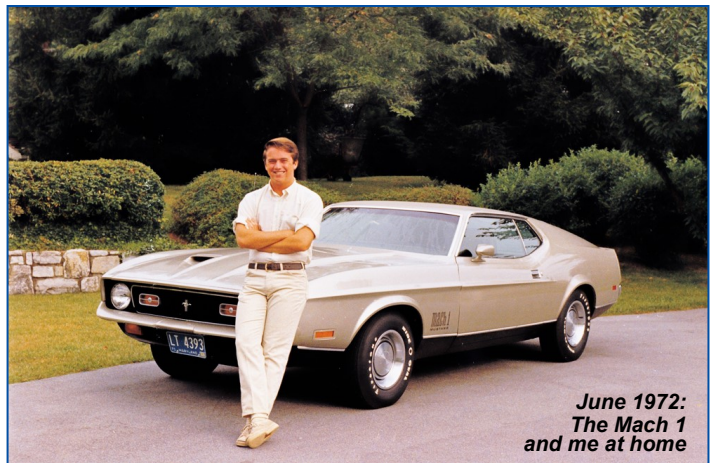
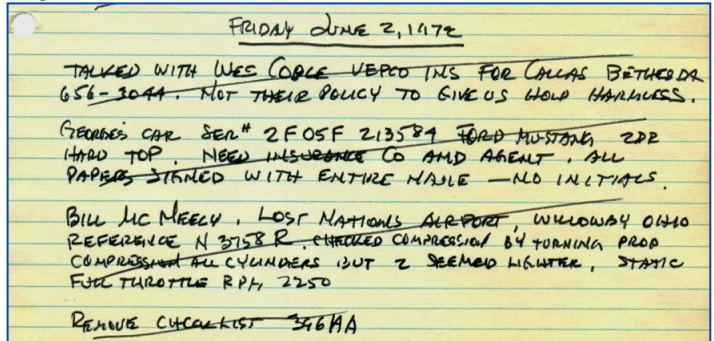
Yours truly and an early “car” with my dad’s



Prior to that decision, I wanted a **Grabber Orange mach 1**, but it was not a standard color, and a non-standard color was \$95 extra—a lot back then. **I did, however, build this model**, which I still have.



The winter of 1972 arrived, and it was time to place the order at Massey Ford, in Hagerstown. We were driving down Oak Hill Avenue there, and a brand-new **mach 1** was parked on the opposite side of the street. I asked my dad to turn around to look at it. It was beautiful and painted in Light Pewter Metallic. On the spot, I switched the color I wanted, and shortly thereafter placed the order. On June 2, 1972, the car arrived, and I'll never forget that day! This is the entry from my dad's work log—the second item:

The first time I drove over to Kim's house and pulled into her driveway, her sister looked out of the window and said, “George is here, and he's driving a spaceship!” The **mach 1** always had that effect on people, and to this day, I think it's the most beautiful car I've ever seen.

And yes, I built a model of this car before the real one arrived—AND I still have it, too.

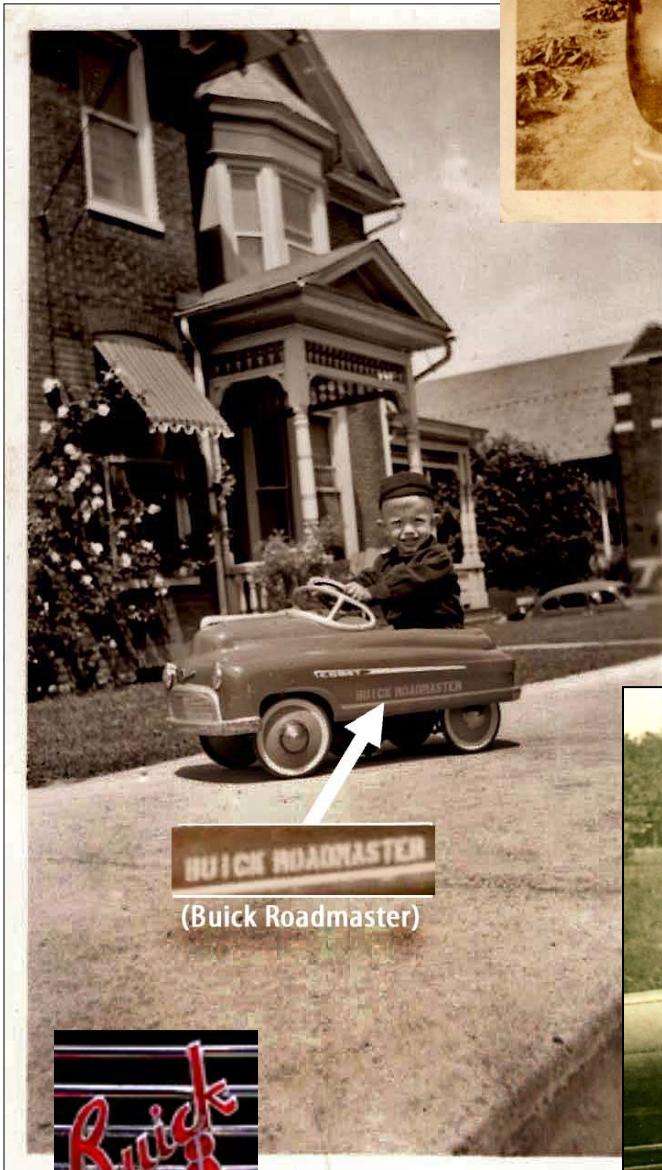
ALWAYS A BUICK MAN!

You know my preference for old Buicks. One of these pictures is of my parent's 1934 Buick Series 40 Coupe, with my mother at the wheel. A 6 VOLT TO 12 VOLT CONVERTER

I wanted to be able to plug things like a phone charger and a GPS into my 1940 LaSalle, but of course these accessories are 12v negative ground, and the LaSalle is 6v positive ground. I found an inexpensive 6v to 12v step-up converter on Amazon:

I considered installing it under the dash and connecting it to the cigarette lighter outlet, but that would mean I would need to electrically isolate the outside of the lighter outlet since it uses the car body as ground, the car is positive ground, and the 12v outlet would be negative ground. Instead, I decided to make a converter box that would plug into the 6v positive ground cigarette lighter and have an outlet for 12v negative ground. The box I chose was:

I purchased a Y cigarette lighter port splitter and used the male part to plug into the cigarette lighter outlet and be the input to the converter and the female as the output of the converter. I have attached photos of the finished product.

It works great!

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Friends:

- Region Picnic Canceled – May be rescheduled on an impromptu basis in the very late summer or fall.
- AACA 2020 Eastern Division Tour – status update
- 2020 St. Michaels Concours d'Elegance is cancelled
- AACA 2020 Eastern Fall Meet in Hershey is reduced to a one day show

In this year of our public health and economic discontent I write you from my 'safer at home' bunker, from where I have largely hidden myself away since at least March 15th, a period of 90+ consecutive days. I have gone outside. I have maintained my property. I have gassed up a car so I can drive four miles round trip to pick up groceries through the Harris Teeter Express-Lane®. I have had InstaCart® deliver food stuffs from BJ's that I order and paid for online. The FedEx and UPS drivers wonder what happened to us if a day goes by without a delivery.

I suspect these experiences have been repeated ad infinitum by most if not all of our members with differences accounting for geography and other circumstances. I feel your pain. That sentiment is appropriate for 'Presidents' to express, is it not? What more I have to tell you as it relates to the Antique Automobile Club of America, the Bay Country Region and the state of the classic car hobby in general will not make you feel better in the short term however.

Our shared tale of woe is taking place in the backdrop of a pandemic which is reordering our civic and economic existence. The pace of resuming civic and economic activity in Maryland is progressing slowly. Given what little I know about epidemiology and economics, the pace seems appropriate. Still I wish fewer people were infected and that fewer people died. I wish fewer people lost their jobs and that fewer businesses had to shutdown, with some having to close permanently.

As I anticipate events which are still technically active and open on our Region Calendar such as the Region Picnic, scheduled for late June, and the 2020 Eastern Division Tour scheduled for mid August I have to take notice of the efforts undertaken by Governor Larry Hogan and his Administration in resuming civic and economic activity in Maryland. On May 29 at 5PM the State of Maryland moved to fully implement Stage One of a three stage reopening plan which includes many sub-stage milestones. Of primary interest to us as we determine what we can keep, postpone or cancel on our calendar, two items from Maryland's yet to start Stage Two are most relevant. Initially Stage Two **will likely be a longer stage of the initial recovery**. This tells me, if it is likely going to take a month or more to progress through Stage One, it will take longer to get through Stage Two. The state indicates it will likely begin **raising the cap on social gatherings** during Stage Two but doesn't say by when or by how much.

The bottom line is that our Picnic cannot happen until we are assured a group of our size can reasonably get together. For that reason alone the Picnic scheduled for June 27th is indefinitely postponed. If we are able to reschedule the Picnic in 2020, the caterer Ken and Sally have so successfully used in the past is now a business casualty of the economic downturn and regulatory burdens brought on by the pandemic. At some point hopefully we can schedule a "bring your own – eat your own" impromptu pic-

nic, but such a date is not currently discernable.

The 2020 AACA Eastern Division Tour, to be jointly hosted by the Bay Country and Eastern Shore Regions is still technically on the calendar. The Tour Committee is considering three options as to how to proceed with the Tour.

The first option is to maintain the Tour on its already rescheduled dates of August 12-15, 2020 but I think this is least likely option we will choose based on the same rationales that required we cancel the Region Picnic. The second option is to conduct the tour on rescheduled dates we are currently discussing with the national AACA. The third option is to cancel the Tour without rescheduling. There is too much uncertainty between options two and three for me to make an educated guess as to which will prevail.

I am also pained to let you know that the 2020 St. Michaels Concours d'Elegance, scheduled for September, within our Region footprint, has been cancelled. The organizers have announced the event will return on September 26, 2021.

Finally, and for the first time in anyone's memory, the full AACA Eastern Fall Meet has been cancelled by the Hershey Region. There only will be a one-day car show. More than anything else I've seen since I last wrote to you in April this tells me how far we have fallen, and how far we have to go to climb back out, to again enjoy our hobby as we have in the "before" times.

On the plus side our friends at the Classic Motor Museum restarted their Cars and Coffee tradition on May 30th. I didn't go but I am anxious to learn if any of our members attended. Consider posting your experience on our Facebook page at <https://www.facebook.com/BayCountryRegionAACA/>

In closing, my service to you this year has been so devoid of substance that I do not expect to earn any service credit for being your 2020 President. Please keep yourselves safe and healthy. We will see each other again. I just don't know when or under which circumstances.

THAT PACKARD BUILDING

In the January-February issue I described Philadelphia's Packard Motor Car Building, which I discovered while attending the AACA's National meeting. In the May/June issue of the AACA's magazine, *Antique Automobile*, mention was made of it that sheds some light on it. Editor West Peterson's article, on Page 10, describes his search for information about the original owner of his family's 1930 Packard 7-34 Speedster Eight runabout:

"The car's identification number plate indicates that it was delivered to its new owner from "Packard Inc., Philadelphia, Pa., July 1930." (Packard Inc. was

Packard Motor Company's Philadelphia distributor, which sold cars to surrounding dealers. Oftentimes, custom-built cars, such as the Speedster, were delivered directly by the distributor, and not a dealer.)"

Peterson gives an interesting account of his search for Nelson W. Brinkerhoff, the original owner, which I enjoyed reading, but I was particularly interested to learn more about the Packard Building.
